

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# How to turn on and off the power of the remote cameras

## How to turn on the power of the remote cameras

The power of the remote cameras in the standby state can be turned on from the unit.

There are the following methods of turning on the power.

- Turning on the power one camera at a time
- Turning on the power of the cameras simultaneously with the turning on of the unit's power
- Turning on the power of multiple cameras
  - ◇ Turning on the power of all the cameras
  - ◇ Turning on the power of the selected camera group


Each of these methods is described in turn below.

### Turning on the power one camera at a time

#### 1. Select the remote camera.

When the corresponding camera selection button [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] is held down for approximately 3 seconds, the name of the remote camera is displayed on the top line of the LCD panel and "POWER: OFF↓" is displayed on the bottom line.

#### 2. Turn the F2 dial to select "ON" while keeping the camera selection button held down and then press the F2 dial.



### Turning on the power of the cameras simultaneously with the turning on of the unit's power

1. Set the MENU button to ON.
2. Open CAMERA SETUP menu [24].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "2. AUTO ON" item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select "On" and press the F2 dial. The power of the remote cameras set to "Serial" or "Network" in CTRL TYPE menu [36] will now turn on simultaneously with the turning on of the unit's power.

#### Note

- Depending on the number of cameras connected, it may take some time before you can operate the unit.

### Turning on the power of multiple cameras

1. Set the MENU button to ON. Press the MENU button to turn on its indicator.
2. Open CAMERA SETUP menu [24].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "1. CAM POWER" item.



#### ■ Turning on the power of all the cameras

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "ALL ON" and press the F2 dial.



#### ■ Turning on the power of the selected camera group

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "GROUP ON" and press the F2 dial.



## How to turn off the power of the remote cameras

The power of the remote cameras can be turned off from the unit. There are the following methods of turning off the power.

- Turning off the power one camera at a time
- Turning off the power of multiple cameras
  - ◇ Turning off the power of all the cameras
  - ◇ Turning off the power of the selected camera group


Each of these methods is described in turn below.

### Turning off the power one camera at a time

#### 1. Select the remote camera.

When the corresponding camera selection button [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] is held down for approximately 3 seconds, the name of the remote camera is displayed on the top line of the LCD panel and "POWER: ON↓" is displayed on the bottom line.

#### 2. Turn the F2 dial to select "OFF" while keeping the camera selection button held down and then press the F2 dial.



### Turning off the power of multiple cameras

1. Set the MENU button to ON.
2. Open CAMERA SETUP menu [24].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "1. CAM POWER" item.

#### ■ Turning off the power of all the cameras

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "ALL OFF" and press the F2 dial.


#### ■ Turning off the power of the selected camera group

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "GROUP OFF" and press the F2 dial.



# Making image adjustments for the selected remote camera

The following settings and adjustments can be made for the selected remote camera directly from this unit.

## <Color adjustment section>



- When the color adjustment ENABLE button indicator is off, operation of the color adjustment section is disabled. Press the button to turn on its indicator and then perform operation.
- The setting value ranges of the gain, pedestal, R and B gain, R and B pedestal, detail, and shutter speed differ depending on the remote camera connected.  
For the setting value ranges of each remote camera, refer to “Table of setting items (menus)” (pages 53 to 55).
- Operation differs as follows when controlling AW-HE60 and AW-HE50.
  - During auto iris (when the auto iris button indicator is on), the shutter speed is adjusted automatically. The shutter speed value set from the unit is not immediately reflected for the camera output images at that time but instead is reflected when manual iris (when the auto iris indicator turns off) is set.
  - While the shooting mode is set to “FullAuto”, the following occurs.
    - Auto gain mode is fixed and the gain setting value cannot be changed from “AUTO”.
    - ATW mode is fixed and the R and B gain setting values cannot be changed.
    - Auto iris is fixed and the shutter speed setting value cannot be changed.
- With the AW-HE2, some operations differ from those described in this section. Refer to “Operations of AW-HE2” (page 51).

### Setting the gain

In places which are too dark, increase the gain level, and in places which are too bright, reduce the gain level.  
When the gain is increased, the noise level also increases.

#### 1. Press the GAIN button.

The current gain setting appears.

GAIN : 18dB

#### 2. Turn the F1 dial to select a setting.

- When the AUTO GAIN button is pressed, auto gain mode is enabled and the light quantity is adjusted automatically.
- If approximately 3 seconds elapses without the F1 dial being operated after the GAIN button is pressed, the previous LCD panel display is redisplayed.

### Setting the pedestal

When using multiple cameras, you need to set the same the black level (pedestal level) for images shot with each camera.

#### 1. Turn the PED dial to select a setting.

Adjustment in the minus (–) direction makes the parts closer to black, and adjustment in the plus (+) direction makes the parts closer to white.

- The setting value is displayed on the LCD panel during setting.
- When the PED dial is pressed, the setting value does not change and is only displayed.

PED : +150

### Setting the white balance

Adjust the ratio between R, G, and B (the three primary colors) so that white will be reproduced accurately.

When the white balance is off, not only will white be reproduced poorly but the color tone of the entire picture will also deteriorate.

The white balance needs to be set when the lighting conditions and brightness have changed. The white balance must also be adjusted when using a remote camera for the first time or when a remote camera has not been used for a prolonged period of time.

The white balance can be adjusted automatically or manually (fine adjustment after automatic adjustment), and results can be stored in two memory areas (A and B) of the remote camera. The result in a memory area can be recalled by pressing the WHITE BAL A button or WHITE BAL B button on the unit.

In addition, you can select the auto tracking white balance (ATW) mode for automatically tracking the white balance in accordance with the lighting conditions.

### Automatically adjusting the white balance

#### 1. With the selected remote camera, fill the screen with a white subject (white wall or paper).

- Make sure a shining object or very bright object does not appear on the screen.

#### 2. Press the WHITE BAL A button to turn on its indicator.

#### 3. Press the AWB button.

The AWB button indicator blinks and the white balance is adjusted automatically.

When adjustment ends successfully, the button indicator turns off and the adjustment results are registered to memory A.

When adjustment was not possible, the AWB button indicator turns on.

Try changing, for example, the lens iris, subject, and lighting conditions, and then perform adjustment again.

#### 4. Press the WHITE BAL B button to turn on its indicator.

#### 5. Press the AWB button.

Similar to step 3, the adjustment results are saved to memory B.

- When the white balance is adjusted automatically, the R and B GAIN setting values become "±0".

### Manually adjusting the white balance (R and B gain settings)

1. As with the automatic adjustment, fill the screen with a white subject.
2. Connect the video output of the currently selected remote camera to a waveform monitor.
3. Press the **WHITE BAL A** button to turn on its indicator.
4. Turn the **R GAIN** dial to select the R channel (red) setting, and turn the **B GAIN** dial to select the B channel (blue) setting.

The adjustment results are registered to memory A.

- The setting value is displayed during adjustment.
- When the R GAIN dial and B GAIN dial are pressed, the setting values do not change and are only displayed.

5. Press the **WHITE BAL B** button to turn on its indicator.  
Perform step 4 in the same way as with the **WHITE BAL A** button to set memory B.

### Auto tracking white adjustment (ATW)

You can select the auto tracking white balance (ATW) mode for automatically tracking the white balance in accordance with the lighting conditions.

1. Press the **ATW** button to turn on its indicator.

ATW mode is enabled.

- If there is no white on the screen, it may not be possible to compensate the white balance properly.  
Also, it may not be possible to compensate the white balance properly depending on the lighting conditions.

### Setting the black balance

The black balance needs to be adjusted when using a remote camera for the first time or when a remote camera has not been used for a prolonged period of time.

It also needs to be adjusted when significant changes have occurred in the ambient temperature or at the change of the seasons.

When the camera will be used with the same settings and under the same conditions, the black balance does not need to be adjusted again. When the black balance is adjusted again, the previous memory data will be erased and replaced with the new black balance settings.

### Automatically adjusting the black balance

1. Press the **ABB** button.

The **ABB** button indicator blinks and the black balance is adjusted by automatically closing the lens iris.

When adjustment ends successfully, the button indicator turns off and the adjustment results are registered.

When adjustment was not possible, the **ABB** button indicator turns on.

- When the black balance is adjusted automatically, the R and B PED setting values return to "±0".

### Manually adjusting the black balance (R and B pedestal adjustment)

1. Connect the video output of the currently selected remote camera to a waveform monitor.
2. Press the **auto iris** button to turn its indicator off.
3. Turn the **IRIS** dial to close the lens iris.
4. Turn the **R PED** dial to select the R channel (red) setting, and turn the **B PED** dial to select the B channel (blue) setting.
  - The setting value is displayed during adjustment.
  - When the R PED dial and B PED dial are pressed, the setting values do not change and are only displayed.

## Selecting the color bars

Press the BARS button to output color bar signals from the remote camera.

**Button indicator off:** Outputs the signal for the images shot by the camera

**Button indicator on:** Outputs the color bar signal

## Setting the detail

The image detail (image sharpness) can be adjusted.

### 1. Press the **DETAIL** button.

The current detail setting appears.



### 2. Turn the F1 dial and F2 dial to select settings.

## Adjusting the shutter speed

The shutter mode and shutter speed of a remote camera can be selected.

### 1. Press the **MENU** button to turn on its indicator.

### 2. Open **SHUTTER** menu [21].

## Setting the shutter mode

### 3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “1. SHUTTER” item.



### 4. Turn the F2 dial to select the shutter mode, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**Off** : Turns off the electronic shutter.

**Step** : Operates the shutter at the shutter speed set in the “2. SPEED” item.

**Synchro** : Operates the shutter at the shutter speed set for the remote camera.

Set the shutter speed value for synchro mode in the OSD menu of the remote camera.

For details, refer to the Operating Instructions for the remote camera.

**ELC** : Controls the electronic shutter and automatically adjusts the light quantity.

- The shutter mode settings differ depending on the remote camera connected. Check the Operating Instructions for the corresponding model.

## Setting the shutter speed

When “Step” has been selected as the shutter mode, you can specify the shutter speed.

### 5. Turn the F1 dial to display the “2. SPEED” item.



### 6. Turn the F2 dial to adjust the shutter speed.


- The shutter speed settings differ depending on the remote camera connected. Check the Operating Instructions for the corresponding model.

#### Note

- For a remote camera connected via a serial connection, when you change the camera group once and then return to the original camera group, the shutter speed is set to “1/100”.

## Setting the shooting mode (SCENE 1 to SCENE 4)

Change the shooting mode (scene file) of the remote camera to match the shooting conditions. Use the SCENE 1 to SCENE 4 buttons to change the shooting mode.



1. Press the SHIFT button to turn on its indicator.

2. Press one of the SCENE 1 to SCENE 4 buttons.

The indicator of the pressed button turns on and the shooting mode changes.

● The names of shooting modes and operation of each mode differ depending on the model of remote camera. For details, refer to the Operating Instructions for the remote camera.

The following shows the relationship between the SCENE 1 to SCENE 4 buttons on the unit and the shooting modes of the remote camera.

## Setting an ND filter

The ND filter setting can be configured when the selected remote camera has a built-in ND filter.

1. Press the **MENU** button to turn on its indicator.
2. Open **ND FILTER** menu [22].

3. Turn the **F2** dial to select a setting, and then press the **F2** dial to confirm the selection.

The settings displayed when you turn the F2 dial differ depending on the model of remote camera connected.

The following shows the menu display on the unit and the setting values of the remote cameras.

(\*) “ND2↓”, “ND3↓”, and “ND4↓” can be displayed by turning the F2 dial but a selection cannot be confirmed by pressing the dial.

## Selecting an ND filter with the USER buttons (USER 1 to USER 8)


The ND filter settings “ND1” to “ND4” can be assigned to the USER buttons (USER 1 to USER 8) to enable selection with the buttons.  
⇒ “Assigning functions to the USER buttons” (page 30)

1. Press one of the **USER** buttons (USER 1 to USER 8).

The indicator of the selected button turns on and the corresponding ND filter is applied.

# Operating the OSD menu of a remote camera

To set the advanced settings of a remote camera, operate the menu superimposed on the image output of the remote camera (this menu is referred to as the OSD menu in this manual). The OSD menu of a connected remote camera can be operated from the unit.



## 1. Hold down the CAMERA OSD button to turn on its indicator.

The OSD menu of the selected remote camera appears and becomes able to be operated from the unit.

## 2. Operate the OSD menu.

Use the F1 dial, F2 dial, and EXIT button to operate the OSD menu.

Operation differs depending on the model connected.

### <Table of operations>

(\*1) Turn clockwise : Moves the items down.

Turn counterclockwise : Moves the items up.

(\*2) Turn clockwise : Changes the setting in the plus (+) direction.

Turn counterclockwise : Changes the setting in the minus (-) direction.

(\*3) Turning the dial changes the setting and instantaneously reflects the new value on the remote camera.

Turn clockwise : Changes the setting in the plus (+) direction and confirms the value.

Turn counterclockwise : Changes the setting in the minus (-) direction and confirms the value.

## 3. Hold down the CAMERA OSD button to turn off its indicator.

The menus of the unit become able to be operated.

### Notes

- When the unit is operating the OSD menu of a remote camera, the CAMERA OSD button lighting state and OSD menu display state may no longer match and OSD menu operation may not be able to be performed properly if the OSD menu OFF operation is performed for the same remote camera from, for example, another remote camera controller or a wireless remote controller. In such a case, hold down the CAMERA OSD button on the unit, and after the CAMERA OSD button lighting state (off) and OSD menu display state (OSD menu hidden) match, hold down the CAMERA OSD button again and then perform the operation.
- If a camera selection button [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] is pressed to switch to another remote camera to control from the unit during the display of the OSD menu of a remote camera, the OSD menu of the remote camera that was selected disappears.
- For details on the menu items that are displayed, check the Operating Instructions for the corresponding model.

# Operating preset memory (PMEM)

The preset memory of a remote camera can be operated from the unit. The following settings that you have adjusted in advance can be stored in preset memory.


- Pan/tilt positions
- Lens iris settings (manual iris only)
- Zoom positions
- White balance settings
- Focus positions
- Gain

## Notes

- If the MEM ENABLE button indicator is off, preset memory operation is not possible. Press the button to turn on its indicator and then perform operation.
- Preset numbers PMEM 1 to 10 are also used as start positions when recalling tracing memory. Preset data may be overwritten by tracing memory operation.
- The number of preset memory that can be registered differs depending on the remote camera. For details, check the Operating Instructions for the corresponding model.
- The white balance setting and gain are registered to only the preset memory of AW-HE50, AW-HE60, and AW-HE120. The white balance setting that is registered is that which results from application of manual R/B gain adjustment to the automatic white balance adjustment. When the preset memory is recalled, the same color tones as at the time of registration are reproduced but the R/B gain values become 0.

## ● Changing pages

Press one of the number buttons [1] to [50] to directly select any of the 50 preset memory. Furthermore, pressing the PMEM PAGE button to change pages allows you to operate up to 100 preset memory for each camera.



### <Preset numbers and registered pages>

| Preset number       | Page number | Number button |
|---------------------|-------------|---------------|
| PMEM 1 to PMEM 50   | Page 1      | [1] to [50]   |
| PMEM 51 to PMEM 100 | Page 2      |               |

Example: When specifying preset number "PMEM 51"


1. Press the PMEM PAGE button to select Page 2.
2. Press number button [1].

## ● Lighting of number button indicators

The lighting method of the number buttons differs depending on the remote camera or pan-tilt head that the unit is controlling.

### <Lighting method of number button indicators>

| Remote cameras and pan-tilt heads                | Lighting method of number button indicators   |
|--|---|
| AW-HE50, AW-HE60, AW-HE120                       | The indicators of the number buttons with preset memory registered turn on.   |
| AW-HE100, AW-PH360, AW-PH405, AW-PH650, AW-PH400 | The indicator of the number button that was last pressed turns on. However, when preset memory is deleted in DELETE mode, all of the number buttons turn off. |



## Registering preset memory (STORE)

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.
2. Output the images to be shot to the monitor.
3. Press the PMEM button to turn on its indicator.
4. Press the MEM STORE button to turn on its indicator.
5. Operate the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button to determine the camera angle to register.  
If necessary, adjust the focus and iris as well.
6. Hold down a number button to specify the preset number to register.  
"STORE COMPLETE" appears on the second line of the LCD panel. The current camera positions and settings are registered to the preset memory of the remote camera.
  - To continue registering different camera angles to a preset memory belonging to the same "page number", repeat steps 5 to 6.

### Notes

- When registering preset memory, hold down the number button.
- If a number button that already has preset memory registered is held down, the saved data will be deleted as it will be overwritten.  
However, if a number button that already has tracing memory registered is held down, "Used by TMEM." will be displayed on the LCD panel and the corresponding preset memory data will not be overwritten.

## Recalling preset memory (RECALL)

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.
2. Press the PMEM button to turn on its indicator.
3. Hold down a number button to specify the preset number to recall.  
The registered settings are recalled.
  - When the indicator of the MEM STORE button or MEM DELETE button is on, preset memory is not recalled when a number button is pressed.  
Press the PMEM button or press the MEM STORE button or MEM DELETE button with the indicator turned on to turn off its indicator, and then perform the operation.

## Deleting preset memory (DELETE)

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.
2. Press the PMEM button to turn on its indicator.
3. Press the MEM DELETE button to turn on its indicator.
4. Hold down a number button to specify the preset number to delete.  
"DELETE COMPLETE" appears on the second line of the LCD panel and the registered settings are deleted.

### Notes

- When deleting preset memory, hold down the number button.
- When the preset number used with tracing memory is held down, "Used by TMEM." will be displayed on the LCD panel and the corresponding preset memory data will not be deleted.  
⇒ For details on tracing memory, refer to "Deleting tracing memory (DELETE)" (page 20).
- If the above operation is performed when controlling AW-PH400 (connected via AW-IF400), "DELETE COMPLETE" is displayed on the LCD panel but deletion of the preset memory is not executed and the registered settings are retained.

## Setting the operation items for when preset memory is recalled (PRESET SCOPE)

You can select whether to recall all or only some of the settings registered to preset memory.

### Note

- This function is enabled when AW-HE50, AW-HE60, or AW-HE120 is selected.

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.

2. Press the PMEM button to turn on its indicator.

3. Press the MEM SETTING button.

The setting of the selected remote camera is displayed.

SPEED : 30↓  
SCOPE : MODE A↓

- If approximately 3 seconds elapses without an operation being performed, the previous LCD panel display is redisplayed.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select a setting for the “SCOPE” item from MODE A to MODE C, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

The setting of the remote camera is changed.

This is applied the next time the preset memory is recalled.

### <SCOPE settings and recalled items>

| Setting | Recalled item              |      |                              |
|---------|----------------------------|------|------------------------------|
|         | Pan, tilt, zoom, and focus | Iris | White balance settings, Gain |
| MODE A  | √                          | √    | √                            |

√: Recalled —: Not recalled

### Note

- MODE A to MODE C are not registered to the remote camera preset memory or the unit. The settings become the common settings for when preset memory is recalled, and the same settings are applied regardless of which preset number is selected.

## Setting the speed at which to move to the position set in the preset memory (PRESET SPEED)

The speed (PRESET SPEED) at which to move to the set position when preset memory is recalled can be set from the unit.

With this unit, you can select from the following two PRESET SPEED recall modes.

- Move at the common PRESET SPEED set for the remote cameras.
- Move at the PRESET SPEED registered for each preset number of the unit.

This allows the remote cameras to be operated at a different speed for each preset number depending on operation, enabling video playback at a variety of speeds.

### Note

- The movement speeds registered in the procedure below are registered to the corresponding camera numbers in the unit, and are not registered to the preset memory of the remote cameras. Therefore, if the recall mode is set to “On” and the preset memory is recalled on a controller other than the AW-RP120 on which the movement speed was registered, movement will be at a different speed even in the case of the same preset number.

## Setting PRESET SPEED on remote cameras

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.

2. Press the PMEM button to turn on its indicator.

3. Press the MEM SETTING button.

The setting of the selected remote camera is displayed.

SPEED : 30↓  
SCOPE : MODE A↓

- If approximately 3 seconds elapses without an operation being performed, the previous LCD panel display is redisplayed.

### Note

- When a remote camera other than AW-HE50, AW-HE60, or AW-HE120 is controlled, the last value set for the corresponding remote camera on the unit is displayed.

4. Turn the F1 dial to select the setting of the “SPEED” item, and then press the F1 dial to confirm the selection.

The PRESET SPEED value is set on the remote cameras.

The following shows the relationship between the set value and the speed at which the remote camera moves to the set position when preset memory is recalled.

### Registering PRESET SPEED on the unit

To register the PRESET SPEED value to a preset number of the unit, perform the following steps after the previous procedure.

**5. Press the MEM STORE button to turn on its indicator.**

**6. Hold down a number button to specify the preset number to register.**

The current remote camera settings are registered to preset memory, and PRESET SPEED is registered to the unit.

- To continue registering a different PRESET SPEED value to a preset memory belonging to the same “page number”, repeat steps 3 → 4 → 6.

### Setting the PRESET SPEED recall mode

**1. Press the MENU button to turn on its indicator.**

**2. Open CAMERA SETUP menu [24].**

**3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “3. RECALL PST SPD” item.**

**4. Turn the F2 dial to select the recall mode, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.**

**Off** : Recalling preset memory moves the remote cameras at the speed of the PRESET SPEED values set on the remote cameras.

**On** : Recalling preset memory moves the remote cameras at the speed of the PRESET SPEED value registered for each preset number on the unit.

# Operating preset memory groups (PMEM GROUP)

The unit allows you register up to four “preset memory groups” created by selecting one preset memory for each of multiple remote cameras. Pressing any of the PM GRP 1 to PM GRP 4 buttons simultaneously recalls all preset memory registered to the corresponding preset memory group.

The following setting procedures use the example of setting PMEM GROUP1 but the setting procedures are the same for PMEM GROUP2 to PMEM GROUP4. Open the following menus and configure the settings.

## <Preset memory groups and menu numbers>

## Setting the operation mode (SEPARATE/ALL)

1. Press the MENU button to turn on its indicator.

2. Open PM GRP1 menu [31].

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “1. PM GRP1 MODE” item.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select the operation mode, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

- OFF** : Disables group creation.  
Even if you press any of the PM GRP1 to PM GRP4 buttons, a preset memory group will not be recalled.
- SEPARATE** : Allows you to create a group by selecting a different preset number from each remote camera.  
Up to ten preset numbers can be registered to one group.
- ALL** : Allows you to create a group by selecting the same preset number from each remote camera.  
One preset number for each of all the remote cameras registered to the unit can be registered to one group.

## Creating preset memory groups

### Registering the preset memory to recall when in SEPARATE mode

1. Press the MENU button to turn on its indicator.

2. Open PM GRP1 menu [31].

If you turn the F2 dial to select the camera number and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection, you will then be able to select the preset number.

Set the preset number in the same way as the camera number.

When “NoAsgn” is set, preset memory is not registered.

5. Turn the F1 dial to display the “3. PM GRP1 2/10” to “11. PM GRP1 10/10” items.

6. Register the camera numbers and preset numbers.

- Configure the settings in the same way as step 4.
- Up to ten preset memory can be registered to one group.

#### Note

- Do not set the same camera number two or more times for one preset memory group.

**Registering the preset memory to recall when in ALL mode**

1. Press the MENU button to turn on its indicator.

2. Open PM GRP1 menu [31].



3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "12. PM GRP1 ALL" item.



- Preset memory is not recalled for a remote camera for which "NoAssign" is set in CTRL TYPE menu [36].

**Note**

- If the USER ENABLE button indicator is off, operation of the PM GRP 1 to PM GRP 4 buttons is not possible. Perform operation while the button indicator is on.

**Recalling a preset memory group by GPI input**

A preset memory group can be recalled by contact input of the TALLY/ GPI connector on the rear panel of the unit.

# Operating tracing memory (TMEM)

The unit incorporates tracing memory (TMEM) for recording a series of operations that were performed for a connected remote camera. This feature allows you to duplicate the recorded operations of a remote camera.



### Notes

- If the MEM ENABLE button indicator is off, tracing memory operation is not possible. Perform operation while the button indicator is on.
- Preset numbers PMEM 1 to 10 of the preset memory are used as start positions at the time of recalling tracing memory so they are overwritten when the tracing memory registration operation is performed.
- The last point when tracing memory is recalled may not match that at the time of recording because of the error of movement of the remote camera.  
Taking precautions such as the following can help reduce the error.
  - Use the lens zoom at the WIDE side (wide-angle end).
  - Perform pan, tilt, zoom, and focus operations slowly.
  - Set a short recording time.
 Execute tracing memory recalling several times to sufficiently check the operation of the remote camera before you begin operation.

2. Output the images to be shot to the monitor.

- A button with no tracing memory registered does not turn on even when it is a button with preset memory registered.

If necessary, adjust the focus, iris, and white balance as well.

- To record the focus operation and iris operation to tracing memory, press the auto focus button and auto iris button to turn off their indicators and then perform the operations.

**6. Hold down one of the number buttons [1] to [10] that has its indicator turned off to specify the tracing memory number.**

The current camera position and settings are registered to the preset memory of the remote camera, and become the start position and settings at the time of recalling.

The indicators of the number button that was held down and START button [11] blink. (Recording standby state)

- If an operation that is target for recording such as moving the PAN/TILT lever is performed at that time, the recording standby state is canceled and the status returns to that of step 3.

- If a button with the same number as a registered preset memory is held down, the saved preset memory will be deleted as it will be overwritten.

Recording stops and the tracing memory is saved.

The registered number button turns on and the status returns to that of step 3.

- When the possible recording time elapses, recording stops automatically.
- At that time, operations up until the point in time that recording stops are recorded.

**1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.**

The tracing memory status appears.

**2. Press the TMEM button to turn on its indicator.**

The tracing memory status appears.

The indicators of number buttons with registered tracing memory turn on.

**Note**

- A button with no tracing memory registered does not turn on even when it is a button with preset memory registered.

**3. Press one of the number buttons that has its indicator turned on to specify the tracing memory number.**

The remote camera moves to the start position.

The indicators of the number button that was pressed and START button [11] blink. (Recall standby state)

**4. Press START button [11].**

The tracing memory is recalled and the remote camera starts moving.

**5. When the recording time elapses, the remote camera stops automatically.**

The number button that was blinking turns on, the indicator of START button [11] turns off, and the process returns to step 2.

- Pressing the STOP button [12] or performing an operation that is target for recording such as moving the PAN/TILT lever during recalling will stop recalling and return the process to step 2.

## Deleting tracing memory (DELETE)

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be operated.
2. Press the TMEM button to turn on its indicator.  
The tracing memory status appears.  
The indicators of number buttons with registered tracing memory turn on.



### Note

- A button with no tracing memory registered does not turn on even when it is a button with preset memory registered.

3. Press the MEM DELETE button to turn on its indicator.
4. Hold down one of the number buttons [1] to [10] that has its indicator turned on to specify the tracing memory number.  
The registered preset memory (start position) and tracing memory are deleted.

## Restoring tracing memory (RESTORE)

Some of the recorded tracing memory data can be overwritten. For example, you can record just the ZOOM operation again while leaving the data recorded for the PAN/TILT operation as is. Or you can leave the data for the first half of the recorded PAN/TILT operation as is and record just the second half of the operation again.

- It is not possible to correct just an arbitrary section of recorded tracing memory data.

1. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to select the remote camera to be controlled from the unit.
2. Output the images to be shot to the monitor.
3. Press the TMEM button to turn on its indicator.  
The tracing memory status appears.  
The indicators of number buttons with registered tracing memory turn on.



### Note


- A button with no tracing memory registered does not turn on even when it is a button with preset memory registered.

4. Press the RESTORE button to turn on its indicator.
  5. Press one of the number buttons [1] to [10] that has its indicator turned on.  
The remote camera moves to the start position.  
The indicators of the number button that was pressed and START button [11] blink. (Restore standby state)
- At this time, you can operate the PAN/TILT lever to change the start position.

**7. Operate one of the PAN/TILT lever, ZOOM button, FOCUS dial, IRIS dial, and white balance mode selection buttons to make a correction.**

Overwriting is performed from the point in time that the correction operation is performed.

**Note**

- It is not possible to correct just an arbitrary section of recorded tracing memory data. The registered data is deleted from the point in time that the operation is performed so continue the operation until the recording time ends to register the new data.

**8. When the recording time elapses, the remote camera stops automatically.**

The process returns to step 3.

- When STOP button [12] is pressed during recalling, recalling stops. The total time of the tracing memory changes, and the process returns to step 3.

**Setting the items to recall when recalling tracing memory**


You can select whether to recall all or only some of the items registered to tracing memory.

**Note**

- This function is enabled when AW-HE50, AW-HE60, or AW-HE120 is selected.

**1. Press the MEM SETTING button.**

The current setting appears.



- If approximately 3 seconds elapses without an operation being performed, the previous LCD panel display is redisplayed.

**2. Turn the F2 dial to select a setting for the “SCOPE” item from MODE A to MODE C, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.**

The setting of the unit is changed.

This is applied the next time the tracing memory is recalled.



# Configuring the remote camera operation settings

## Adjusting the operation speed of the pan, tilt, zoom, and focus

The dedicated dials can be used to individually adjust the operation speed of the remote camera for each of the PAN/TILT lever, ZOOM button, and FOCUS dial operations performed with the unit.



### ■ Operation of SPEED dial

- Turned clockwise : Operation is at a higher speed (HI)
- Turned counterclockwise : Operation is at a lower speed (LOW)

## Setting the PAN/TILT lever inclination and speed


The correlation between the angle and operating speed when the PAN/TILT lever is inclined can be adjusted.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open RP SETUP menu [25].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "2. P/T CURV" item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select a setting, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

- The higher the value selected, the slower the operation when the lever begins to be moved.



### Setting the pan, tilt, zoom, and focus operation directions

You can set the direction that a remote camera moves in response to the operation of the PAN/TILT lever, ZOOM button, and FOCUS dial. With this unit, you can set the direction for each camera number.

#### Setting the panning direction

Set the operation of the remote camera in the horizontal direction in response to the horizontal operation of the PAN/TILT lever.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open PAN DIRECTION menu [26].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the camera number for which to configure the setting.

1 . CAM1  
NORMAL ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “NORMAL” or “REVERSE”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**NORMAL** : The remote camera moves to the left when the PAN/TILT lever is moved toward the left, and to the right when the lever is moved toward the right.

**REVERSE** : Operation is in the opposite direction to NORMAL.

#### Setting the tilting direction

Set the operation of the remote camera in the vertical direction in response to forward and backward operation of the PAN/TILT lever.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open TILT DIRECTION menu [27].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the camera number for which to configure the setting.

1 . CAM1  
NORMAL ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “NORMAL” or “REVERSE”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**NORMAL** : The remote camera moves upward when the PAN/TILT lever is moved away from you, and downward when the lever is moved toward you.

**REVERSE** : Operation is in the opposite direction to NORMAL.

#### Setting the zooming direction

Set the zooming operation of the lens in response to the operation of the ZOOM button.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open ZOOM DIRECTION menu [28].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the camera number for which to configure the setting.

1 . CAM1  
NORMAL ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “NORMAL” or “REVERSE”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**NORMAL** : The lens zooms toward the telephoto end when the TELE side of the ZOOM button is pressed, and toward the wide-angle end when the WIDE side is pressed.

**REVERSE** : Operation is in the opposite direction to NORMAL.

### Setting the focusing direction

Set the focusing operation of the lens in response to the operation of the FOCUS dial.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open FOCUS DIRECTION menu [29].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the camera number for which to configure the setting.

1 . CAM1  
NORMAL ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “NORMAL” or “REVERSE”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**NORMAL** : The focus moves toward the far end when the FOCUS dial is turned clockwise, and toward the near end when the dial is turned counterclockwise.

**REVERSE**: Operation is in the opposite direction to NORMAL.

### Setting the minimum lens zoom start speed

Correct the zoom control amount to send from the unit so that the lens zoom starts to move smoothly when the ZOOM button is pressed in slowly.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open PTZ ADJUST menu [30].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “1. Z MIN SPEED” item.

1 . Z MIN SPEED  
Off ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select the correction amount, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

- The lowest correction amount is “1”, and the highest is “8”. No correction is made with the “Off” setting.

While observing the images on a monitor, press the ZOOM button slowly and check whether the lens zoom starts moving smoothly.

### Setting the speed of the pan and tilt operations for telephoto shooting

During telephoto shooting, the remote camera’s pan and tilt operations are slowed down to make positioning easier.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open PTZ ADJUST menu [30].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “2. SPEED WITH Z” item.

2 . SPEED WITH Z  
Off ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : The pan and tilt operations during telephoto shooting are slow.  
**Off** : Movement is at normal speed.

#### Note

- This function is enabled when AW-HE50, AW-HE60, or AW-HE120 is connected.

### Setting the movement ranges (limiter function) of a remote camera

Depending on the installation location, there may be an obstruction in a movement range of a remote camera, and the remote camera may come into contact with that obstruction when the pan or tilt operation is performed.

A malfunction or accident may occur if the remote camera comes into contact with the obstruction so you need to set a limiter in front of the obstruction to prevent contact.

Also set a limiter if there is a subject you do not wish to shoot in a movement range.

From the unit, you can configure the remote camera limiter setting for the direction of each of the up, down, left, and right limits.


#### Setting procedure

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open PTZ ADJUST menu [30].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "3. LIMIT UP" item.

#### ■ When AW-HE50, AW-HE60, or AW-HE120:

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "On", and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

The position in the up direction of the currently selected remote camera is set as the up limit and the limiter is enabled. (The setting is stored in the remote camera.)




- Turning the F2 dial to display "Off↓" and then pressing the F2 dial to confirm the selection cancels the limiter.

#### ■ When other remote camera

4. Press the F2 dial to confirm the setting.

The position in the up direction of the currently selected remote camera is set as the up limit and the limiter is enabled. (The setting is stored in the remote camera.)



- If the F2 dial is turned or the F1 dial is turned to display another item and then the "3. LIMIT UP" item is redisplayed, "EXEC ↓" reappears on the second line of the LCD panel. If the F2 dial is pressed at this time, "LIMIT OFF" is displayed and the limiter is canceled.

5. Turn the F1 dial to display the "4. LIMIT DOWN", "5. LIMIT LEFT", or "6. LIMIT RIGHT" item. Perform the same operation as step 4 to set the down limit, left limit, and right limit.

| Menu item   | Setting target |

### Returning a remote cameras to its home position

Move a remote camera to the home position stored in advance on the camera.

#### Note

- The position stored as the home position on the remote camera cannot be changed.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open CAMERA SETUP menu [24].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "5. HOME POSITION" item.



4. Press the F2 dial. The remote camera moves to its home position.

## Controlling the peripheral devices connected to a remote camera

The peripheral devices connected to a remote camera can be controlled. Control the devices with FUNCTION menu [23].

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open FUNCTION menu [23].

### Controlling an AW-PS300A AC adapter

When an AW-PH360 is being controlled with the unit, you can control an AW-PS300A AC adapter via the AW-PH360.

- For details on how to connect the AW-PH360 and AW-PS300A, refer to the Operating Instructions for each device.

#### ■ Controlling an option switch control output terminal

The short circuiting and open circuiting of the option switch control output terminal [OPTION SW CONTROL OUT] of the AW-PS300A can be controlled.

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "1. OPTION" item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select "Off" or "On", and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Short circuits the OPTION SW CONTROL OUT terminal.

**Off** : Open circuits the OPTION SW CONTROL OUT terminal.

#### Note

- When AW-HE60 is connected, you can switch between normal shooting mode and night mode in the "1. OPTION" item.

**On** : Sets night mode.

**Off** : Sets normal shooting mode.

When the mode is set to night mode, the shining of an infrared light on the subject enables shooting under low illumination which would normally make shooting difficult. Furthermore, the output video becomes black and white.

Also refer to the Operating Instructions for the AW-HE60.

#### ■ Controlling the lamp AC outlet

The ON and OFF of the lamp AC outlet [LAMP AC OUT] of the AW-PS300A can be controlled.

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "5. LAMP" item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select "Off" or "On", and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Enables the LAMP AC OUT connector.

**Off** : Disables the LAMP AC OUT connector.

## Controlling a defroster

When the selected remote camera is equipped with a defroster function (AW-PH650 + camera), the defroster can be controlled.

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "2. DEFROSTER" item.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "Off" or "On", and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.



## Controlling a wiper

When the selected remote camera is equipped with a wiper function (AW-PH650 + camera), the wiper can be controlled.

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "3. WIPER" item.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "Off" or "On", and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.



## Controlling a heater or fan

When the selected remote camera is equipped with a heater or fan function (AW-PH650 + camera), the heater or fan can be controlled.

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the "4. HEATER/FAN" item.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select "Off" or "On", and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.



# Configuring the unit operation settings

## Enabling or disabling operation with the ENABLE buttons

The unit has five ENABLE buttons.

Each of the ENABLE buttons can be used to independently enable or disable the corresponding operation shown below.

### Color adjustment ENABLE button


- Operation of color adjustment section

### MEM ENABLE button

- Operation of memory (preset memory and tracing memory)

### USER ENABLE button

- Operation of USER buttons



### FOCUS/ZOOM/IRIS ENABLE button

- Operation of FOCUS dial, ZOOM button, and IRIS dial

### PAN/TILT ENABLE button

- Operation of PAN/TILT lever

## 1. Press the ENABLE button.

The button indicator lighting state changes.

**Button indicator on or blinking:** Operation of the corresponding functions are enabled.

**Button indicator off:** Operation of the corresponding functions are disabled.

- Menu operation is possible even when the MEM ENABLE button indicator is off.
- The PAN/TILT ENABLE button indicator blinks while the PAN/TILT lever is being used to operate the switcher.  
⇒ "Operating the switcher with the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button" (page 34)
- The FOCUS/ZOOM/IRIS ENABLE button indicator blinks while the ZOOM button is being used to operate the switcher.  
⇒ "Operating the switcher with the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button" (page 34)
- When the operation of the ENABLE buttons is disabled by menu operation, operating the ENABLE buttons has no effect.  
⇒ "Enabling or disabling operation of the ENABLE buttons by menu operation" (page 28)

## Enabling or disabling operation of the ENABLE buttons by menu operation

Operation of the ENABLE buttons can be enabled or disabled by menu operation.

Disabling operation prevents erroneous operation because the enable/disable states become unable to be changed even by pressing the ENABLE buttons.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open RP SETUP menu [25].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “4. ENABLE BUTTON” item.

4. ENABLE BUTTON  
ACTIVE↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “ACTIVE” or “LOCK”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**ACTIVE**: Enables operation of the ENABLE buttons.

**LOCK**: Disables operation of the ENABLE buttons.

- Setting this to “LOCK” retains the ENABLE button states (operation is enabled or disabled in accordance with the lighting states), but ENABLE button operation has no effect.

### Memo

- Connecting an external device to the TALLY/GPI connector (GPI input: GPI IN 5) on the rear panel enables the “4. ENABLE BUTTON” item to be controlled from the external device. Each time GPI IN 5 is set to On (30 ms or longer), the setting of the “4. ENABLE BUTTON” item switches between “ACTIVE” and “LOCK”.

## Enabling or disabling menu operation

Menu operation can be enabled or disabled.

### Disabling MENU operation

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open RP SETUP menu [25].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “5. MENU CONTROL” item.
4. Turn the F2 dial to select “LOCK”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

Menu operation is disabled.

If a number button with a menu assigned is pressed, “LOCKED!” appears on the LCD panel and the menu does not open.

- Memory (preset memory and tracing memory) operation is still possible even when menu operation is disabled.



### Memo

- Connecting an external device to the TALLY/GPI connector (GPI input: GPI IN 6) on the rear panel enables the “5. MENU CONTROL” item to be controlled from the external device. Each time GPI IN 6 is set to On (30 ms or longer), the setting of the “5. MENU CONTROL” item switches between “ACTIVE” and “LOCK”.

## Switching the focus operation and iris operation

The operations of the FOCUS dial and IRIS dial can be switched.

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “1. FOCUS/IRIS” item.

**EXCHANGE** : Switches the operations of the FOCUS dial and IRIS dial.

- When this is set to “EXCHANGE”, the operations of the auto focus button and auto iris button are also switched.  
The one-touch auto focus button is disabled.  
Operation of the FOCUS SPEED dial is disabled.  
(SPEED is fixed to the value set at the time when this setting was changed to EXCHANGE.)

**STANDARD** : Restores the default operations of the FOCUS dial and IRIS dial.

## Setting the LCD panel backlight

The backlight of the LCD panel can be turned on or off. It can also be set to turn off automatically.

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open RP SETUP menu [25].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “3. LCD BACKLIGHT” item.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select a setting, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Turns on the backlight.



**60, 120, 180** : Turns off the backlight automatically when the unit has not been operated within the set time (60, 120, or 180 minutes).

The backlight turns off after the time elapses and then turns on again when the unit is operated.


## Assigning functions to the USER buttons

Functions can be assigned to the eight USER buttons (USER 1 to USER 8). This enables you to operate a desired function by simply pressing a USER button (USER 1 or USER 8).

- When executing the function assigned to a USER button, press the SHIFT button to turn off its indicator and then perform the operation.  
When a USER button is pressed while the SHIFT button indicator is on, either the preset memory group is called or shooting mode selection of the remote camera is executed.

Configure the settings for linking the unit with an optional switcher. To use the function for linking with a switcher, you need to set the following in advance.

## ■ Settings for the connection between unit and switcher

Refer to “Settings for connecting with the remote cameras and switcher” in <Basics> (page 29).

## ■ Settings on the switcher

The following settings can be configured on the AW-HS50.

- **Enabling the function for linking with the unit**  
Set the “10. CamCont Link” item of [13] Operation Menu to “On”.
- **Displaying the remote camera names sent by the unit**  
Set the “4. Name Type” item of [10.1] SDI-IN1 to [10.4] SDI-IN4 or the “2. Name Type” item of [10.5] DVI-IN in [10] Input Menu to “CAM Name”.
- **Displaying icons at the bottom left of the sub screen for images of the remote camera selected on the unit when the switcher is outputting images of multi view**  
Set the “6. Input Status” item of [8] MultiView Out/Frame Menu to “On”.

For details, refer to the Operating Instructions for the switcher.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select the corresponding camera number, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

## Enabling or disabling the function for linking with the switcher

Enable or disable the entire function for linking between the unit and switcher.

2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “1. SWLINK” item.

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

On : Enables the function for linking with the switcher.  
Off : Disables the function for linking with the switcher.

## Memo

- Enabling and disabling the link function can be assigned to a USER button.  
Open USER BUTTON menu [35], display one of the “1. USER1” to “8. USER8” items, and set “SWLINK”.
- When the USER button with “SWLINK” assigned is pressed, the operation is as follows.  
**Button indicator on** : Enables the function for linking with the switcher.  
**Button indicator off** : Disables the function for linking with the switcher.

## Note

- Up to one AW-RP120 or AW-RP50 can be linked to one switcher. Therefore, it is not possible to link the unit to a switcher that already has another AW-RP120 or an AW-RP50 linked. Disable the link function of the unit that is already linked and then enable the link function on this unit.

# Setting the functions for when the unit is linked with the switcher

Set the functions that can be used when there is a link between the unit and switcher.

Each of the functions needs to be set in advance in SW FUNCTION menu [42] and SW INPUT menu [43].

⇒ “Registering the camera numbers that will correspond to the image inputs of the switcher” (page 31)

⇒ “Enabling or disabling the function for linking with the switcher” (page 31)

## BUSCONT function

Select the bus material of the switcher from the unit.

When the BUSCONT function is enabled, the bus material of the switcher can be selected in conjunction with camera selection on the unit.

### Note

- When the link setting of a camera number is changed with AUTO IP menu [37], SWAP IP menu [38], or MANUAL IP menu [39] or a camera number corresponding to an image input of the switcher is changed with SW INPUT menu [43], the bus material of the switcher will not be changed immediately even if the BUSCONT function is enabled. Press one of the camera selection buttons [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] to make a selection again.

## Enabling or disabling the BUSCONT function

1. Press the MENU button.

2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “2. BUSCONT” item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Enables the BUSCONT function.

**Off** : Disables the BUSCONT function.

### Memo

- Enabling and disabling the BUSCONT function can be assigned to a USER button.

Open USER BUTTON menu [35], display one of the “1. USER1” to “8. USER8” items, and set “BUSCONT”.

- When the USER button with “BUSCONT” assigned is pressed, the operation is as follows.

**Button indicator on** : Enables the BUSCONT function.

**Button indicator off** : Disables the BUSCONT function.

## Setting the switcher bus to control with the BUSCONT function

When the BUSCONT function is enabled, you can set the switcher bus to control with a camera selection button [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT] on the unit.

1. Press the MENU button.

2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].

3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “3. BUS” item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select a setting, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the setting.

**AUX** : The AUX bus of the switcher is the control target.

**PVW** : The PVW bus of the switcher is the control target.

**PinP** : The PinP bus of the switcher is the control target.

**KEY** : The KEY bus of the switcher is the control target.

### FOCUS ASSIST function

Control the AUX bus of the switcher and switch between the “images of multi view” and the “images of the selected remote camera”. Assigning this function to a USER button makes it optimal for adjusting the focus and other settings because you can fill the screen with the images of the selected remote camera with just the press of a button.

#### Setting the FOCUS ASSIST function

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “4. FOCUS ASSIST” item.

4. FOCUS ASSIST  
Off ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Switches the images of the AUX bus output from the switcher to the images of the remote camera selected with the unit.

**Off** : Switches the images of the AUX bus output from the switcher to the images of multi view.

#### Memo

- The FOCUS ASSIST function can be assigned to a USER button. Open **USER BUTTON** menu [35], display one of the “1. USER1” to “8. USER8” items, and set “FASSIST”.
- When the USER button with “FASSIST” assigned is pressed, the operation is as follows.
  - Button indicator on** : Switches the images of the AUX bus output from the switcher to the images of the remote camera selected with the unit.
  - Button indicator off** : Switches the images of the AUX bus output from the switcher to the images of multi view.

### CAMERA SELECT view function

Set the unit to display icons at the bottom left of the sub screen for images of the selected remote camera when the switcher is outputting images of multi view.

#### Enabling or disabling the CAMERA SELECT function

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “5. CAMERA SELECT” item.

5. CAMERA SELECT  
Off ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Enables the CAMERA SELECT view function.

**Off** : Disables the CAMERA SELECT view function.

## TALLY IP function

Enable TALLY IP to receive OA tally information from the switcher via the network.  
The lighting statuses of the camera status indicators on the unit and the tally lamps on the remote cameras are changed based on the received OA tally information.

### Enabling or disabling the TALLY IP function

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “6. TALLY\_IP” item.

6. TALLY\_IP  
Off ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

**On** : Enables the TALLY IP function.  
**Off** : Disables the TALLY IP function.

- To enable tally lamp on instructions to be sent to a remote camera based on the tally information received from the switcher, you need to display the “4. TALLY OUT” item in CAMERA SETUP menu [24] and then set it to “On”.

#### Note

- The unit also sends the tally lamp on instruction to the corresponding remote camera when the unit receives tally information for a camera number belonging to a camera group that is not selected.

## Operating the switcher with the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button

You can use the unit's PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button to change switcher settings (PinP position and size, etc.).

### Setting the application of the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “7. P/T/Z CONTROL” item.

7. P/T/Z CONTROL  
CAM ↓

4. Turn the F2 dial to select a setting, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.

#### CAM:

Allows you to operate the remote camera selected on the unit with the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button.

#### SW:

Allows you to change the switcher settings with the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button.

#### Button Select:

Allows you to select the operation target of the PAN/TILT lever and ZOOM button (remote cameras or switcher) by pressing the PAN/TILT ENABLE button or FOCUS/ZOOM/IRIS ENABLE button.

For each of the setting values above, the lighting state of the button indicator changes as follows when the PAN/TILT ENABLE button or FOCUS/ZOOM/IRIS ENABLE button is pressed.

## CAM INF function

You can display the remote camera setting information acquired by the unit on the switcher AUX bus output images or multi view images.

- The setting information for a remote camera connected via a serial connection is displayed only when the camera is selected with a camera selection button [CAMERA SELECT/GROUP SELECT].

### Enabling or disabling the CAM INF function

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open SW FUNCTION menu [42].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the “8. CAM INF” item.



4. Turn the F2 dial to select “On” or “Off”, and then press the F2 dial to confirm the selection.
  - On : Enables the CAM INF view function.
  - Off : Disables the CAM INF view function.



- Enabling and disabling the CAM INF function can be assigned to a USER button. Open USER BUTTON menu [35], display one of the “1. USER1” to “8. USER8” items, and set “CAMINF”.



# Memory card operations

The unit allows you to use a memory card to perform the following operations.

**SAVE** : Save the configuration data of the unit or a remote camera to a memory card.

**LOAD** : Load the configuration data saved to a memory card to the unit or a remote camera.

Use "up to eight single-byte alphanumeric characters" for the \*\*\*\*\* part above. A file name other than the above may not be displayed properly on the unit.

\*2 : The IP address, subnet mask, default gateway settings of the unit and the user authentication settings (user name and password) are not target for the SAVE and LOAD operations.

\*3 : Only the following data for one selected remote camera is target for SAVE and LOAD.

- Settings of each shooting mode (scene file)
- Preset memory data
- System settings

\*4 : The following data is target for SAVE and LOAD.

- Tracing memory data  
All data of camera numbers CAM1 to CAM10
- PRESET SPEED  
PRESET SPEED values set for all preset numbers of camera numbers CAM1 to CAM100

## Notes

- SAVE and LOAD are not possible with the CAM item of a camera connected via a serial connection.
- Preset memory data is not included in "RPMEM".  
Therefore, when a different remote camera than the one when SAVE was executed is connected, just loading "RPMEM" to the unit will not result in the start position being recalled when the tracing memory is recalled.  
When replacing a remote camera, also execute SAVE and LOAD of "CAM".

## Precautions on handling memory cards

- Never remove a memory card while the memory card access lamp is lit or blinking.  
If you remove a memory card while the memory card access lamp is lit or blinking, the data saved to the memory card may be lost.
- The data stored in a memory card may be lost due to, for example, the loss or incorrect operation of the memory card.  
We recommend saving any important data to a computer or other device.

## Memory cards

Memory cards used with the unit should conform to SD or SDHC standards.

Be sure to use the unit to format memory cards.

Memory cards with the following capacity can be used with the unit.

SDXC memory cards and MultiMediaCards (MMC) are not supported.

- Observe the following points when using and storing the memory cards.
  - Avoid high temperature and humidity.
  - Avoid water droplets.
  - Avoid static electricity.

## Initializing a memory card (INIT)

Before using a memory card with the unit, **be sure to initialize the memory card with the unit.**

When the memory card is initialized, the memory card is formatted (in compliance with SD standards) and dedicated directories are created.

### Note

- If you initialize a memory card, all of the files stored in the memory card will be deleted.  
Be sure to execute initialization after confirming the data because any data that is deleted by the initialization cannot be recovered.

1. Press the MENU button to turn on its indicator.

2. Open SD DELETE menu [48].

# Tally settings

The unit can receive the tally information of the switcher and other external devices from the TALLY/GPI connector (TALLY input) on the rear panel and two network lines.

To enable turning on the camera status indicators on the unit and the tally lamps on the remote cameras based on the received tally information, you need to configure the following settings.

## ■ Registering the camera numbers that will correspond to the TALLY inputs

Setting is required to use TALLY IN1 to TALLY IN10 signals from the TALLY/GPI connector (TALLY input) on the rear panel. Refer to the relevant explanation in this section.

## ■ Registering the camera numbers that will correspond to the image inputs of the switcher

Setting is required to use tally information received via the network. Refer to "Setting linking with a switcher" (page 31).

## ■ Setting the sending of tally information from the unit to remote cameras

Refer to the relevant explanation in this section.

## ■ Settings on remote cameras

Setting is required on the remote camera to enable turning on the tally lamp. Refer to the Operating Instructions for the corresponding model.

### Registering the camera numbers that will correspond to the TALLY inputs

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open TALLY menu [44].
3. Turn the F1 dial to select the TALLY input connector number.

#### Note

- When multiple remote camera controllers (this unit or AW-RP50) are connected to one remote camera, the tally information sent by each remote camera controller may not match and the tally lamp on the remote camera may not light correctly. In cases like this, set this setting to "On" on one of the remote camera controllers and "Off" on the other remote camera controllers.

# Checking alarm information

In the event of an error with the power supply of the unit or a remote camera included in the selected camera group, the ALARM indicator on the unit turns on and the output of the GPI OUT connector (GPI OUT 5) becomes On.

When an error occurs, you can check the alarm information by menu operation.

## Displaying alarm information

1. Press the MENU button.
2. Open ALARM menu [50].
3. Turn the F1 dial to display the item you want to check.  
The alarm status is displayed on the bottom line of the LCD panel.

Trouble has occurred with the cooling fan and pan/tilt operation.

(\*1) CAM### is used to indicate a camera number included in the selected camera group. For example, when the F1 dial is turned while camera group "10" is selected, "2. CAM91" to "11. CAM100" are displayed on the top line of the LCD panel.

### Note

- When an alarm has occurred, stop operation immediately and be sure to contact your dealer.  
Continued use may cause the unit or a remote camera to malfunction.

## Returning the unit to the factory default state (INITIALIZE)

You can restore the settings stored on the unit to the factory defaults (INITIALIZE).

When executing INITIALIZE, select one of "ALL" or "SETUP".

- ALL** : Restores all settings to the factory default state (executes INITIALIZE).
- SETUP**: Restores only some settings to the factory default state (executes INITIALIZE).





# Setup Software

Setup Software is an application for configuring the settings for connecting the unit with the remote cameras and switcher from a personal computer. The settings can be configured while confirming each item in a list.

- The settings for connecting the unit with the remote cameras and switcher can also be configured using just the unit. For how to configure the settings on the unit, refer to “Settings for connecting with the remote cameras and switcher” in <Basics> (page 29).

## Notes

**When using Setup Software to configure the settings from a personal computer, observe the following.**

- Do not perform any operation on the unit.
- Do not start Setup Software on any other computer in the same network.
- Do not use “Easy IP Setup Software” supplied with AW-HE120, AW-HE60, and AW-HE50.

## Installing the software

This section describes how to install Setup Software.

1. Insert the CD-ROM supplied with the unit into the CD-ROM drive of the personal computer on which the application is going to be installed.
2. Copy the entire folder containing “Setup Software” on the CD-ROM to the hard disk drive of the personal computer.
3. Double-click “RP120Tool.exe” in the copied “Setup Software” folder to start Setup Software.

## Configuring the settings of the personal computer




**12 RECEIVE PORT NO**

Set the port numbers for the unit to receive camera information update notifications from remote cameras.  
Possible setting range: 61000 to 65535

- Set 10 port numbers because update notifications are received from the remote cameras included in the selected camera group. After entering the information on the “C001” to “C010” lines, click [SET] button to reflect the changes.

**13 ALARM**

Displays the alarm information of the remote cameras. It is displayed for the remote cameras belonging to the camera group selected on the unit.  
For remote cameras with a serial connection, the information is only displayed when a remote camera is selected on the unit.

**14 RENEW button**

Executes “RENEW IP ADR” in AUTO IP menu [37] of the unit. When you click [RENEW] button, the link setting targets (camera numbers and switcher) corresponding to the remote cameras and switcher newly detected by the unit are displayed in yellow. If you click [SET] button next, the settings are confirmed and the IP addresses of the remote cameras and switcher are updated. If you click [CANCEL] button, the settings are not reflected.

**15 KEEP button**

Executes “KEEP IP ADR” in AUTO IP menu [37] of the unit. When you click [KEEP] button, the link setting targets (camera numbers and switcher) corresponding to the remote cameras and switcher newly detected by the unit are displayed in yellow. If you click [SET] button next, the settings are confirmed and the connection destination IP addresses of the unit are updated. If you click [CANCEL] button, the settings are not reflected.

**16 REFRESH button**

Loads the connection information set on the unit to the personal computer and refreshes the display on the “Setting” tab.

**17 ALL CLEAR button**

Executes “ALL CLEAR” in AUTO IP menu [37] of the unit. When you click [ALL CLEAR] button, the connection types and the connection destination IP addresses set on the unit are initialized.

- When a connection type is set to “Network”, it is changed to “NoAssign”. When a connection type is set to “Serial”, it is not changed.

**18 SET button**

Confirms the changes on the “Setting” tab and updates the settings on the unit.

**19 CANCEL button**

Cancels the settings that were configured on the “Setting” tab.

## Setting user authentication

To control remote cameras that have the user authentication function enabled, you need to set the user name and password on the AW-RP120. Configure this setting on the “User Auth.” tab of this application.

- The user authentication function is only enabled when the unit is controlling remote cameras connected with IP connections. Also refer to the Operating Instructions for the remote cameras.
